

SPIRIT OF AMERICA YOUTH LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

On March 10, five students and one chaperone left for Philadelphia and Valley Forge for the Spirit of America Youth Leadership Conference.

Each of the five students wrote an essay, participated in an interview and was selected to receive a scholarship to attend the conference. The scholarship, given in commemoration of a Medal of Honor recipient, covered the tuition, board and room and airfare.

There was a small number of students at the conference with groups from Texas and Nebraska. The students got to know each other well and made some good friends.

The conference was a full four days of activities and opportunities to learn about our American history and the principles of the founding of our American republic. The students heard from Thomas Jefferson and John Adams (historical interpreters) to learn about issues confronted in the founding of the country. The students participated in a mock session of Congress as they applied the Bill of Rights and the continuum between liberty and security to proposed bills.

The students heard a speaker about free enterprise and then participated in a free enterprise challenge in which groups developed a product to present to a panel of judges. The students learned about the qualities and criteria for awarding the Medal of Honor and applied what they learned to leadership.

A snowstorm kept the group from visiting Valley Forge (how ironic), yet the group did get to travel the next day to Philadelphia to visit Independence Hall and the Liberty Bell.

The Saturday evening ended with a banquet, a guest speaker on the Cold War, and a signing ceremony in which the students were able to sign their names to a copy of the Declaration of Independence.
